New TVA rates will change how you use power

(Note: This is the last article in a three-part series examining TVA's plan to change its rate structure.)

Next month, the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) will begin billing its distributors for wholesale power under a new rate structure that is based on when electricity is used.

"It's important our customers understand that this rate change is revenue neutral for TVA," says Charlie Riggs, manager of customer accounting for Murfreesboro Electric Department (MED). It will bring no additional money to TVA. Rather, it will link the price charged for electricity with the hourly and seasonal

costs of generating power.

In an effort to ease into the transition toward a true 'time of use' rate structure, TVA's rate change is a 'nearly flat' model. "For example, where costs for the summer months are higher, TVA is lowering prices a bit," explains Riggs. "And where the costs for off-peak times are lower, TVA is raising them a bit."

The result is that, for now, the rates MED will pay for the wholesale power it distributes will be almost the same across a 12-month period as they were under the former rate structure.

MED is studying how to change its own rate structure to match the way it will be billed by TVA. When that change

is made, customers will begin to see how their monthly bills are impacted by the time of day they use energy.

"The price you pay for electricity will depend on when you use it," says Steve Sax, MED general manager. "If you'll take advantage of technology and adjust your habits, you could actually save money."

As an example, Sax says many new appliances — including washers and dishwashers — now come with time-delay features. These allow consumers to program their appliances for off-peak hours when power is less expensive.

This transition period will also encourage customers to develop new

This Earth Day, remember that small things can have a big impact

If you find yourself in the market for a new water heater, refrigerator or other household appliance, pay special attention to the Energy Star efficiency rating. The better the rating, the lower your electric bill next month.

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energy use habits. “When people start shifting their high-energy activities to non-peak times, when the price to produce that energy is lower, they will start to see a difference in their power bill,” says Sax.

For now, the rate change only affects how TVA charges MED for wholesale power. “Our residential customers will not see an immediate change in how they are billed,” Sax explains. “But that change is coming, and our customers should start thinking about their energy use habits. We will keep them informed as we move, along with the rest of country, toward a true time of use model.” ♦
